Some Important Developments

After taking many factors into consideration, the Trustees of the First Spiritual Temple have decided that the Church's location on Jacob's Meadow Road is not suitable for the furtherance of our mission and ministry. As some of you commented, the Jacob's Meadow Chapel was certainly a place of peace and spiritual tranquility, and we fully agree with this. Rev. Simeon worked tirelessly to create a space which was conducive and in harmony with both the original Boston and Brookline Temples. However, other factors had to be taken into consideration.

The Trustees and governing Board of the Church had to look at our long-range goals and plans; not simply what felt right at the moment. Therefore, we have made the following decisions:

◆ The Trustees recently purchased a small parsonage and office space for the Church. The parsonage and office are now located in a lovely section of Sandwich, Massachusetts: **56 John Ewer Road.**

◆ As noted in the last issue of *The Sower*, we have decided to postpone purchasing a new Temple facility until such time that just the right property comes our way; furthermore, we have every intention of remaining on Cape Cod. We are even considering purchasing land and having a new Temple built, specifically suited to our current and long-range plans. We know that God and Spirit will guide us in this endeavor.

◆ In the meantime, we are looking to rent space for the religious, spiritual, healing, and educational ministries of the Church. Until we find the right place, all public events for the Church have been suspended. Obviously, we are saddened by this, but the Trustees are ac-

tively and rigorously checking out locations that will be suitable for our work. Our internet ministry will continue to expand and serve the needs of the global community. Our hope is to resume public events in the early part of 2018.

◆ In order to reach out to you, our readers, and offer you what we can, under these circumstances, *The Sower* will be used as the religious and spiritual "voice" of the First Spiritual Temple. Rather than news items, *The Sower* will focus on matters that pertain to the common good. We will also be sending out fliers and material pertinent to various religious holidays. Our plan here is simple: to keep you connected with the spirit of the Temple and the Temple connected with you. At around Thanksgiving, you will receive a very special mailing from the Church.

◆ This September, Rev. Simeon inaugurated a monthly "Pastoral Message" on the Church's website. October's message is online and he is working on creating an archival page for all such messages. These monthly messages will continue even after we resume public events.
